

ABSTRACT

The principal aim of this conference is to bring together scholars of various fields who work with recycled inscribed pottery sherds, in order to examine writing on ostraca as a cultural practice. Particular attention will be paid to the types and purpose of documents inscribed on sherds, their material aspects, and the context in which they were produced and utilized (such as geographical, historical, social, and archaeological). With the increase in discoveries and publication of ostraca in the last few decades, the questions of new methodologies that allow for careful recording, analyzing, and interpretation of the material have come to the fore and will be addressed in the conference.
